### FEATURE PROFILE

#### **Viktoria (Stella) Hardwick**

Stella moved to the Heights on February 28<sup>th</sup> this year and currently resides upstairs on Oakridge.

She was born on April 17<sup>th</sup>, 1923 in the small village of Borgafjohtus, Iceland. Viktoria (Stella) was named after Queen Victoria and was the fourth child in a family of five. Stella had two brothers and two sisters. She remembers going sailing on her Dad's boat when she was young and rowing across the fjord. Her Dad was the Captain of the Boats and made his living catching cod and sea fish. He often sailed to England to sell his catch from the Norwegian Sea. The family moved to Eskifjord on the eastern coast of Iceland when

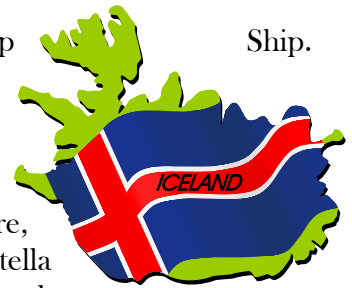


Stella was just a baby. Stella and her siblings walked 4 miles each way to school. They had split classes so were only at school for 4 hours, but she spent much of her spare time reading and learning her lessons at home for the next class. Stella's Mom took in sewing for others and looked after her family. The meals often consisted of fish, (boiled or fried with onions), potatoes and bread, and sometimes meatballs. According to Stella, the winters were very cold. Sometimes they had to go in the rowing boat part way to get to school if there was too much snow to wade. They had to wait for the tide to go out before they could walk to the village.

Stella finished school when she was 12 years old and went to work in Reykjavik as a helpmate for a family with two children. She stayed there for 3 years until the war broke out. Stella moved back home and found employment cooking in a Café where she served the soldiers who were defending Iceland. She was very busy. William Hardwick was one of the soldiers and he took an instant shine to Stella. They soon were courting, dancing the night away and fell in love. They were married in Iceland in 1942 when Stella was 19. This war bride travelled to Great Britain with



her husband on a Troop Ship. The ship docked in Greenwich, Scotland and then they travelled by train to Bill's hometown of Wakefield in Yorkshire, England. At this time Stella



only spoke Icelandic. A few days after her arrival her husband was off to fight the war; leaving Stella to get to know her mother-in-law and sister-in-laws. They made her feel very welcome and helped her learn to speak English fluently. She loved horses and enjoyed watching John Wayne movies. Stella lived with her in-laws for a few months and then thanks to the fine skills her Mother taught her, got a job at a Sewing Place. She rented a little house and kept it until Bill returned from the war in 1945. The Council (Government) built houses for the soldiers and their families, so they moved into one of these new homes. Bill worked for a coal company delivering coal to the villagers.

Stella and Bill had four children: Sylvia in 1944, Billie in 1946, John in 1953 and Eamonn in 1955. This working Mom sewed from 9 am - 4 pm until the children came home from school at Wakefield. They lived just outside of Wakefield at Crofton.

The Hardwicks lived in England for 46 years. Their son John had moved to Canada in 1977. Bill and Stella decided to follow John in 1988 and moved in with John and Margaret and their family near Dunchurch. Sadly, their son John passed away 11 years ago and Stella's husband Bill died 8 years ago. This cheerful little lady started out her marriage living with her mother-in-law and ended it living with her daughter-in-law (who also works

here). Stella loves her grandchildren and great-grandchildren in England, but cherishes spending quality time with her three grandchildren Steven, Barbara and Sharon in Ontario, as well as Barbara's daughter Sitara. Stella enjoys knitting and sewing. She has knitted numerous baby outfits, and sold them at the Dunchurch Fall Fairs. She has won prizes at the fair for her beautiful handiwork. In her room on Oakridge, Stella is still active, putting together jig saw puzzles and making friends at the

Heights. Stella is shown in the picture with tiny her Icelandic doll and a picture of her childhood home by the sea in the background. Welcome to Belvedere, Stella! We hope you enjoy life here and look forward to seeing you every day and getting to know you better!

## Tried & Tested Recipe Maple Muffins

2 cups flour  
 $\frac{1}{2}$  cup brown sugar  
 2 tsp baking powder  
 $\frac{1}{2}$  tsp ground cinnamon  
 $\frac{1}{2}$  tsp salt  
 $\frac{3}{4}$  cup milk  
 $\frac{1}{2}$  cup butter, melted  
 $\frac{1}{2}$  cup maple syrup  
 $\frac{1}{4}$  cup sour cream  
 1 egg  
 $\frac{1}{2}$  tsp vanilla extract



### Topping:

3 tlbs flour; 3 tlbs sugar; 2 tlbs chopped nuts  $\frac{1}{2}$  tsp ground cinnamon; 2 tlbs butter  
 Combine flour, brown sugar, baking powder, cinnamon and salt in a large bowl. In another bowl combine milk, butter, syrup, sour cream, egg and vanilla. Stir in dry ingredients just until moistened. Fill muffin cups  $\frac{2}{3}$  full. Combine topping mixture and work until crumbly. Sprinkle over batter. Bake at 400 degrees for 16 minutes or until tooth inserted near centre comes out clean. Cool 5 min.
