The Symbols of Christmas (and their origins)

<u>Christmas Bells</u> – Bells, especially church bells, have traditionally been associated with Christmas for a long time. In the Anglican and Catholic churches, the church day starts at sunset, so any service after that is the first service of the day. A service on Christmas Eve after sunset is traditionally the first service of Christmas day! In churches that have a Bell or Bells, they are often rung to signal the start of this service.

In Victorian times, it was very fashionable to go carol singing with small hand bells to play the tune of the carol. Sometimes there would only be the bells and no singing!

<u>Candy Canes</u> – The Christmas Candy Cane originated in Germany about 250 years ago. They started as straight white sugar sticks. Sometime around 1900 the red stripes were added and they were flavored with peppermint or wintergreen.

Christmas Cards – The custom of sending Christmas cards was started in the U.K. in 1843 by Sir Henry Cole. Sir Henry had the idea of Christmas cards with his friend John Horsley, who was an artist. They designed the first card and sold them for 1 shilling each (about 8 cents)! The card had three panels. The outer two panels showed people caring for the poor and in the centre panel was a family having a large Christmas dinner!

Nowadays, cards have all sorts of pictures on them including winter pictures, Santa Claus or romantic scenes of life in past times.

<u>Christmas Carols</u> – Carols were first sung in Europe thousands of years ago, but these were not Christmas Carols. They were pagan songs, sung at the Winter Solstice celebrations as people danced around stone circles. The word Carol actually means dance or a song of praise and joy!

Before carol singing in public became popular, there were sometimes official carol singers called "Waits".

They were called "Waits" because they only sang on Christmas Eve (this was sometimes known as 'watchnight' or 'waitnight' because of the shepherds watching their sheep when the angels appeared to them).

Colors of Christmas – Most of the colours and their meanings come from the western/northern European traditions and customs, when Christmas is in the middle of winter and it's dark and cold. Evergreen plants, like Holly, Ivy and Mistletoe have been used for thousands of years to decorate and brighten up buildings during the long dark winter. They also reminded people that spring would come and that winter wouldn't last forever! An early use of red at Christmas represented the apples on the Tree of Paradise and the fall of Adam. Red is also the color of Holly berries.

Mistletoe — Mistletoe is a plant that grows on a range of trees including willow, apple and oak. The tradition of hanging it in the house goes back to the times of the ancient Druids. It is supposed to possess mystical powers which bring good luck to the household and ward off evil spirits. It was also used as a sign of love and friendship in Norse mythology and that's where the custom of kissing under Mistletoe comes from. The original custom was that a berry was picked from the sprig of Mistletoe before the person could be kissed and when all the berries had gone, there could be no more kissing!

<u>Christmas Presents</u> — One of the main reasons we have the custom of giving and receiving presents at Christmas is to remind us of the presents given to Jesus by the Wise Men: Frankincense (a perfume used in Jewish worship), Gold (associated with Kings) and Myrrh (a perfume). All over the world, families and friends give presents to each other. Most children believe in a Christmas gift bringer, called Santa, St. Nicholas or Father Christmas.
